2. Handicaps on Cards

All players are responsible for ensuring that their handicaps are showing on their card.

Strictly speaking all 3 handicaps should be shown - Handicap Index, Course Handicap and Playing Handicap - but we have decided that at the very least the card must have the Handicap Index and Playing Handicap.

Please note that should a player include a Playing Handicap which is greater than it should be and signs for a score which is higher than should have been received then the penalty is Disqualification.

If a lower (incorrect) Playing Handicap is provided then there is no penalty but the lower score will stand.

Course News

We are working away on the winter programme and will report on progress over the coming months.

The course is soft as a result of the wettest month of the year last September when 153mm of rain fell, followed by a very wet Oct, Nov and Dec (a total rainfall of 317mm).

This is 35% more than the same period in 2021 and 21% greater than the longterm average (LTA) of 262mm for the same period. It goes without saying this negatively impacts the condition of the course and of course, greatly inhibits the use of buggies.



On a brighter note, I am delighted to announce that Sue Archer and Robert Bradshaw are joining the course committee. They will join Leo Harmon, Ian Barrett, Siobhan Mooney, Ken Monaghan, Patrick Bradshaw and myself on this committee.

We are preparing for meeting with the 'interested parties' on the buggy path proposal on Friday 20th January at 4.30 in the clubhouse. Everyone welcome.

We have agreed with the Competitions Committee to rotate the 12 holes course every two weeks. This is to rest as many holes as we can (especially given the numbers playing in the Winter League), allow maintenance work to be carried out and give variety to our golfers. We will only deviate from this rota when exceptional weather necessitates this.

Finally, we are still awaiting a confirmed delivery date for our new fairway mower. This date has been moved twice already and are pushing for clarity on this. The whole supply chain of course machinery has not settled after the disruption of the pandemic. We will keep you posted on developments.



The groups of beech trees close to the 11th tee, 11th green and 12th tee, are among the most attractive on the course, but like some others of the same venerable age they are, unfortunately, showing serious evidence of fungal decay. The most significant of these trees in terms of play are probably the two to the right side of the 11th green. Magnificent as they are though, their shading effects, unfortunately, have some negative impacts on turfgrass vigour on the nearby playing surfaces.

Other ancient trees on the 2nd nine include a large beech to the right of the 17th fairway. The central part of the trunk of this tree, however, is in an advanced state of decay. The backdrop to the 17th green includes one of the larger sycamore trees on the course, and while its presence is not an issue from a golf stand-point, it contributes significantly to the overall shading of the 17th green by the adjacent woodland. Fine old oak and sycamore trees on the right hand corner of the dog-leg on the 18th, close to the mens 10th medal tee, ensure that there are no short cuts to setting up the third shot to this most challenging of par fives. Avoidance of the trees on the corner of the dog-leg, and the out of bounds beyond, inevitably brings the fine old ash tree on the left hand side of the fairway (close to the 9th green) into the mind of the golfer, if not into play. Of lesser significance to play is the fine old

oak, further up the 18^{th} fairway on the left – occasionally though, this tree can be a serious barrier to an approach from short left of the 18^{th} green.




And of utterly no significance to the golf, but probably as important aesthetically, and perhaps emotionally, are the fine Horse Chestnuts that greet us as we drive through the gates. Here also are a number of specimen Spanish (sweet) chestnuts, some with trunks exceeding a metre in diameter.

Broadleaf and Coniferous Woodlands Planted in 1933 – 1934: The golf course and clubhouse at Delgany are surrounded on three sides (South, North and West) by mixed broadleaf and coniferous woodland, the conifers in the Northern wood having been planted by the State Forestry Service in the period 1933/34. More than likely, though, the

broadleaf trees have either survived from the La Touche woodland plantations or have regenerated naturally. Unlike the more recently planted spinneys on the course, each of these mature woodlands has a very definite structure comprising the Canopy (layer formed by the leaves of the largest trees), the Understory (a secondary canopy below the upper canopy, formed by smaller trees and shrubs) and the Ground Layer (non-woody plants, usually, covering the ground/soil surface).

Within the three woods there is a total of 13 different tree species in the canopy, 12 tree/shrub species in the understory and 35 plant species in the ground cover. Distribution of particular species is highly variable however, and whereas in some cases a particular tree/plant may be present in all three woods, in other cases another species may be present in one wood only. A notable example of the latter is the Douglas Fir in the Southern Wood behind the 17th green – this is the 'bent top' that is used by many golfers to align their approach shots to this green from the other side of the hill.

Details of the occurrence of various species in each part of the three woods are shown in the Appendix. Attention is particularly drawn to the ground cover (Table 3 in Appendix) which is of interest if only for the unlikely names of some of the 35 plants that have been identified there – Cuckoo Flower, Herb Robert, Lords and Ladies, Pignut, Soft Shield Fern and Wavy Hairgrass to name but a few of the more esoteric ones.



Although it would be an unusual experience during a round of golf not to see somebody searching for a golf ball in the woods (especially to the right of the

12th and 13th fairways), the woodlands of Delgany do not have the same strategic significance from a golfing standpoint as the mature specimen trees referred to in the previous section. Nevertheless they are an important feature because they (i) provide a beautiful scenic backdrop to the course (especially to the North) (ii) serve as a buffer against traffic noise from the N11 and (iii) afford living and breeding spaces for a wide variety of bird, animal and insect life.

Up until the mid 1970s the teeing areas for the 'old' 2nd, 6th and 12th holes were in, or bordered, the north wood, affording spectacular views of the countryside down to Wicklow Head. These views are still available but from different tees (8th, 9th, 13th and 15th). The signature feature to be seen to the south from these vantage points is Stylebawn (Harmon's Hill) with peaked summit and sentinel trees, said to have served as a useful landmark for pilots in the early life of the Air Corps: it gets its name from the family who own and farm the land there (Leo Harmon has been a member of Delgany for more than half of its existence). Just west of this is the flat elongated Drummin Hill. And to the east on very clear days, a few times a year, it is possible to see the Welsh mountains, dominated by Snowdonia (exactly 90 miles from the 13th tee).

Mixed Spinneys Planted Since the 1960s: A number of spinneys consisting of mixtures of coniferous and broad leaved species was planted around the golf course in the 1960s/1970s. Within these plantations, conifers are the dominant species, with Scots pine, Sitka spruce, Douglas fir and Western hemlock being the most common (a small number of cypresses within these plantations have generally outlived their attractive growth phase). Broadleaf species in the plantations include larch, oak, birch and cherry. Aside from the plantations, lines and small groups of poplars were planted around the course in the 1950s. Although not particularly attractive, these trees have considerable significance for golf, notably the group short right of the 3rd green and the line to the right of the dog-leg on the 4th hole.

Recent management action in the spinneys has seen the removal of some of the conifers with the objective of freeing up and enhancing growth of the higher quality broadleaf species which will, in time, become the major specimen trees on the golf course. Current management plans for the attractive block of larch to the left of the 10th fairway is to undersow with beech, so that when the larch reaches maturity in 50-60 years time, the woodland cycle will continue with a different though equally attractive species. The commitment of the club to tree planting is further seen in the fact that approximately 3000 new trees/ shrubs have been planted around the course since 2005. Although many of these trees will survive for only 50-60 years, others will grow to be 250 years of age.

Individual Specimen Trees: In the main, these hardwoods were planted to mark accession to office of Captains and Lady Captains at the annual drive–in ceremonies. They date from the late 1980s. The most notable are found in the area on the left side of the 3rd fairway, where there are 20 individual trees representing eight different species including six beech, five maple, three birch, two ash and one each of mountain ash, oak, red oak and sycamore.



In addition, during the Centenary year, 100 individual trees were planted in groups around the course to enhance the wooded atmosphere. These trees can be recognised from the stout stake supports and the identification number of the donor of each tree.

1.4 WILDLIFE

Agricultural practices in the greater Delgany region have changed greatly over the past 50 years or so, from production of tillage crops (potato, turnip, wheat, oats etc.), to mainly grassland. While it is a moot point as to which form of farming is environmentally more friendly, the transfer of land to housing and other types of development has had a negative impact on wild-life activity in the area. For the most part, however, the woodlands, vegetation, spinneys and gorse banks, and even the new clubhouse, of the golf club support and promote an active wildlife population. To this end also, a large area on the right-hand side of the 7th fairway, and various smaller areas elsewhere (for example, left of the 8th green and 17th fairway, not appreciated by 'hookers') are not mown any more and have been allowed to revert to natural species-rich grassland. Here, up to 10 different species of native plants have been identified which will inevitably increase the populations of insects, birds and mammals - biodiversity in action!
