Social News



Greystones Community First Responders would welcome our support for their major fundraising event of the year. They have provided training to our Club members previously and are scheduled to do training on 1st March (see separate notice). They have also attended emergencies in the Club and on the course and gave vital assistance in advance of the arrival of the ambulance and paramedics. Sounds like a good night out for a great cause.



4. ADOLESCENCE

4.1 POST WORLD WAR 1

If the Club's founders showed what could be achieved through determination and courage, their successors in the immediate post-war period revealed that they certainly were not lacking in these qualities either. They quickly got down to business and began by establishing a greens committee to bring the course back to good condition. They invested in new machinery, and Ned Bradshaw, the professional, was 'allowed necessary expenses to enable him to compete in the professional championship competition at Portmarnock.' In addition, more than 60 new members were admitted shortly after the war had ended. Within a short while the Club again became a very popular place for outings, so much so, that the Committee was forced to decide in July 1919 that 'no competitions except those that are connected with the club be allowed on Sundays or bank holidays.' Life throughout the country in 1919 and in the early 1920s was unsettled, and at times chaotic and dangerous. Although there was serious unemployment, increasing the membership continued to be an important, if not the chief objective, and from the end of the Great War to the end of 1923, the Club attracted over 400 new members.

Not surprisingly, the addition of so many members created a few problems, at least for some. A letter to the Committee said that 'the numbers using the course at weekends are altogether unwieldy and the result of this is that several members will not play weekends because they spend the entire day waiting.' The complaint, however, was rejected and the Committee continued to encourage more and more people to play on the course. In January 1925 it decided to 'write to the Dublin press, drawing attention to the dry condition of the Delgany course and pointing out that, when, owing to the wet season several of the links around Dublin could not be played over, the Delgany course was always dry'. Later (1927), the following appeared in an article ('Golf Links in Vicinity of Dublin') in Dublin Guide: 'Delgany - From Westland Row or Harcourt St. Station, by G.S.Rlys. to Greystones, thence by car to Delgany (car return journey, 2/6). 18-hole course finely situated. Visitors, 1/6 per day. Saturdays, 2/-. Sundays and public holidays, 3/-. Phone, Greystones 65.'

The story of Delgany from 1919 up to the early 1930s, then, was one of steady growth in the face of extremely difficult external circumstances. Indeed the membership growth was such that the clubhouse (then located to the right of the current 1st fairway) was no longer adequate, and in 1935 the Club moved into a brand new building on the site of the current one.

4.2 TWO SPECIAL INDIVIDUALS

In any account of the growth of Delgany,

particular mention must be made of two individuals, J.M. Calvert and P.J. Stokes, both of whom are still commemorated by fine trophies played for by the membership. Calvert was Captain in 1921 and those who remembered him said that he was a stern-looking man who 'seldom said no to a ball of malt'.





Stokes and Calvert

Calvert (who died in 1939) was succeeded as Captain by Stokes, who was also elected as Life President in 1931. On a voyage to America, Stokes fell on one of the gangways and never again played golf. Sometimes he did not attend his own President's Prize, but would post the prize to the club. It never varied – a five pound note (€6.35) in an envelope. He died in 1953.

The contribution by the pair was immense. It started with the leading role they played in arousing a spirit of enthusiasm immediately after the World War I. They served on every Committee throughout the 1920s and played a big part in the erection of the new clubhouse in 1935. Their biggest contribution,

however, lay in establishing, and encouraging by example, the unique 'mix' of people which was to become the hallmark of Delgany. It is this 'chemistry' that makes the Club so special, and to Calvert and Stokes, generations of Delgany members are deeply indebted.

5. MATURITY

5.1 POST WORLD WAR 1 (THE 'OLD' DAYS)

In the commemorative booklet marking the 75th anniversary of the Club, the late Vincent Byrne wrote:

'I remember Delgany Golf Club in the years immediately after the war when the green fee was only half a crown (€0.16) and one year's membership was two guineas (€2.67). Paddy and May Cullen had just arrived, with May in charge of the catering and Paddy acting as general everything. A good day's outing could be had for less than a pound (€1.27). There was the green fee of half a crown (€0.16), lunch, half a crown (€0.16) and dinner five shillings (€0.32). You could have losing bets of half a crown (€0.16) on each of two rounds and have enough left for ten bottles of stout at six pence (€0.03) each. There were very few cars to be seen in those days. Most came by bus and carried their clubs from the terminus at Sweeney's pub in the village - now the Delgany Inn.'

'The equipment was not of the standard we see today. My first collection of clubs was purchased from Ned Bradshaw for the huge price of 7/6 (€0.48). They were all hickory–shafted clubs with rusty heads. There was a brassie (2 wood), spoon (3 wood), mashie (5 iron), mashie niblick (7), niblick (8) and putter.'

'Ned Bradshaw was the professional and his workshop was at the back of the clubhouse (a memorial stone now marks this spot). In the winter, it was nice and cosy from the heat of the pot-bellied stove, and before setting off, we would call in for a chat and warm-up. During the summer Sunday evenings old Ned, as he was affectionately known, would arrange a fourball sweep at half a crown (€0.16) per person. He would make the draw and give what he considered fair handicaps. He would check the cards and would dole out the prize money. He would also adjust your handicap as he would deem just.'

'Your game of golf was not as easy as it is today. You had to contend with sheep on the course and wire surrounds to protect the greens from sheep droppings. Greens were rock hard, the fairways very narrow with rough up to your knees.'

'During the turkey competitions, it was not unusual to see a player entering a second, or even a third time, after playing only two holes. Most competitors had caddies and you had to apply to Jackie Mahony for a caddy. Jackie would pay the caddy and give him a tip and then collect from the member.'

5.2 THE GOAT MASCOT and CLUB COLOURS

The following is a bit of speculation that may start a conversation or finish an argument.

There is no certainty about the origin

of the 'goat' as the central figure on the flag and on the crest that is carried on Delgany clothing apparel (sweaters, tops, ties etc.). The same can be said about the combination of colours (black, red, green and white) that forms the background for the goat on these items.

A possible explanation for the colour scheme is that it replicates the colour scheme of the necktie worn by many graduates of Trinity College Dublin (Dublin University). In the early life of the golf club it is likely that Trinity College would have been the more popular third level centre of learning for many members. It is understandable that many of these would have liked to maintain some form of connection between their university and their club.



That such a feeling was prevalent is implied in the fact that a golf match between Dublin University (Trinity College) Golf Society and 'Delgany Mountaineers' was played at Delgany in 1944. A black and white photograph of the Trinity visitors hangs in the main hallway of the clubhouse: a prominent figure in this photograph is R. M. (Bertie) Smyllie, editor of the Irish Times, who at that time had not yet served as Captain of the Club (he was to be Captain in the following years—1945 and 1946).

Also, in the hallway of the clubhouse is a Harry Kernoff pastel portrait of Smyllie, resplendent in a Trinity graduate's tie!



It is conceivable, then, that the colour scheme of the Trinity tie, with a white goat worked into the overall design, became the Delgany tie around this time (1945/46) because of the association of Trinity golfers with the club. One suggestion for the goat is that a statement (perhaps even a snide comment) by a Trinity visitor to the effect that 'you'd need to be a goat to climb the hills of Delgany' was the catalyst for the adoption of the goat as the mascot of the club. Such a suggestion becomes all the more plausible given the group name for the Delgany golfers-Delgany Mountaineers.

And finally...



Our play was sold out for all eight nights and we had many disappointed members contacting Cheryl Ball looking for tickets.

In response to this, Eugene Murray has announced that there will be a DVD of the play available for purchase behind the bar in a few weeks time.

I was recently asked by one of our esteemed members about my work on the Dispatch and how I approach it. Having applied the 24 hour rule (that has turned into three weeks!), I wish to assure him I want the Dispatch to be....
