Course News

Update on our Hollow Coring

This undoubtedly is a very invasive process as you will see from the series of photos that show the operation in detail. The coring process that removes the cores and the collection process that lifts the cores are reasonably straight forward and not overly weather dependent. It would be fantastic if we had our own machinery to do this rather than relying on a contractor where we have to stick to the dates we book this on. That's a story for another day......

Once we have the cores removed and lifted, the really tricky bit starts. The spreading of the sand and the 'brushing in' is very weather dependent as we must have dry (and windy) weather. We have to spread 120 tonnes on our greens. Ideally we do two heavy spreading sessions, where we spread 40 tonnes each time among all of the greens.

The coring was completed on Tuesday morning 14th March. At that stage the forecast was for wet and continuous potential rain over the next week. Actually it was so wet we had to postpone the Verti draining until the fairways dried out somewhat. We got lucky with this Monday and Tuesday morning as it turned out to be excellent spreading conditions and we have completed the 80 tonnes of heavy spreadings. Now we just have to do a couple of light spreadings to complete the job but this is much less intrusive for our golfers. I am highlighting this just to emphasise that we can be at the mercy of the weather and plans can be disrupted from time to time.

Our Sika Deer

Given the deer are long standing visitors to our course and feature quite a lot in this Dispatch issue (obviously they enjoy watching the madness), we thought they were worthy of some background information, Thanks to the **Irish Deer Commission** for

Sika deer are our most common non-native deer species and originated from North eastern Asia (Japan). There are six subspecies of Sika deer with the Japanese Sika deer the common subspecies present in Ireland, there is also evidence of Manchurian Sika in the North West of Ireland. They were introduced by **Lord Powerscourt** in 1860. A few years later some Sika deer from Powerscourt were moved to enclosed parks in Fermanagh, Kerry, Limerick, Down and Monaghan. Our present wild deer herds mostly originated as escapees from these parks in the early 20th century during the Irish Civil War. While some claims have been made, the number of Sika and their hybrids in Ireland are unknown as no national deer census has been carried out. **Sika / Red hybrids are most common in Wicklow** (where pure sika still occurs too) but examples have also been found in Carlow, Dublin and Cork, the latter poses a threat to our native Red deer found in Co Kerry. It is easiest to see Sika deer when they are actively grazing, mainly at dawn or dusk. Sika are extremely shy and one should take great care to approach carefully from downwind. Sika deer are primarily grazers but will eat herbs, heather, young tree shoots and farmed root crops as the opportunity presents itself. The mainly feed in the morning and late evening.

Group size in Sika is usually up to ten animals, consisting of females, follower offspring and non breeding males. Stags on the other hand only join the herds during the rut. Antler development in stags usually reaches it's potential in 7-8 year olds. They will shed antlers in spring and growth

starts immediately. A skin covering called velvet covers the antlers while growing and is scrapped off to reveal hard antlers before September. Sika have a preference for acidic soils and will quickly establish in young pine plantation. Sika are protected under the Wildlife Act 1976 and may be hunted under a section 29 licence granted by the National Parks and Wildlife Service



of the club was marionetted and guided by 'wise men'. J.M. Calvert and P.J. Stokes have already been mentioned but J.B. (Connie) Conroy and Hugh Coyle were two more.

When dealing with thorny issues, it was always the case with these men that the glass was half-full rather than half-empty. Wisdom was put to the test when my application to become a junior member of the club was made - back in 1959. This was a grey area then, arising from the lack of clear rules covering such an application, including the requirement (apparently) that a parent or relative of the applicant had to be a member. The wise men resolved the problem by deciding to confer Honorary Life Membership on my mother, who had been an active playing Lady Associate in the early days of the club, but was no longer

playing. Arising from this I was admitted as a junior, at a charge of one guinea (€1.33). Suddenly it was no longer necessary for me to hop over the wall from my house beside the 1st green to play in what was widely seen in the village to be a 'public playground'!

In the ensuing years, I have played a lot of golf at Delgany and was lucky enough to see, first hand, a number of

exhibition matches played there. These matches involved Harry Bradshaw, Christy O'Connor Snr., Joe Carr, Tom Craddock, Max McCready, David Sheehan (until 2007, the last amateur player to win a Professional event in Europe) and Declan Clarke (arguably the best amateur golfer Delgany ever had). From a spectator stand-point, a lot was to be learned about the game of golf here, as was also the case when Delgany hosted the Leinster Youths Championship in which such great players as Darren Clarke, Padraig Harrington, Paul McGinley, Ronan Rafferty and Philip Walton came to early prominence

5.4 THE FEMININE SIDE

I, Anne MacKeogh, joined Delgany in 1945 after my sister had joined the previous year and my brother a few years prior to that. We lived in Bellevue, beside the course, and before joining we used to sneak in and play. We joined at a guinea (€1.33), the same price as the annual membership fee. In 1947, I won my first prize of two guineas (€2.66) and bought a length of material to make a costume, as it was called then. It was a 'Flag competition' in which you played the holes until you had used up the par of the course plus your handicap: a flag was then pushed into the ground where your last shot rested. I had eleven shots still to play after the 18th hole, and finished on the 20th green. My handicap was reduced from 36 to 25 in one day.

The late, great Harry Bradshaw used to give me lessons. I remember how he used to always walk with his arms

wrapped around a club held across his back, a gentleman's trick to keep a straight back. There were many exciting competitions back then. Eclectic involved playing the back nine twice - it wasn't as hilly - and taking your best score from each hole. In Bisque you played off half your handicap and took your shots on whatever hole you liked, playing against par. In a Sealed Holes competition, the prize donor left an envelope with her choice of nine holes from the eighteen and you received half of your handicap. We ladies had great fun competitions in those days. Now it has all become very serious. It seems boring only playing strokes, par and stableford competitions.

The fun was not just on the golf course.

During the late forties, fifties and sixties we had social nights, usually on Saturdays. We had great sing-songs with pianists like Maura Devereux, Gussy Sheridan, Ray Baker and Liam Murphy. We had a Delgany Dinner Dance each year in one of the local hotels; long dresses for the ladies were the order of the day, with tuxedos for the men. The Glencormick Hotel close to Kilmacanogue was a favourite place until it burned down. In 1965 we held our first Lady Captain's Dinner in the clubhouse. Before that we used to make do with 'high tea', with lots of savouries and fattening cakes.

In the 1960s we decided that it was time to start taking part in inter-club competitions. In 1968 the ladies entered in the Autumn Team matches. We had no success until 1971 and 1972 when we won the 2nd Team Cup for those with handicaps 11 to 16. In 1974 we won the Townsend Foursomes Cup. In that competition we beat Howth, Woodbrook, Milltown and Hermitage before beating Killiney in the final – quite an achievement, considering that these clubs were able to select teams from a much larger panel of players than we were!

In 1974 our Lady Captain, the late Olive Wallace, started the choir for Christmas carols and I am glad to say it is still going strong. While ladies have always felt welcome in the Club, they also felt

a bit barred. From the beginning, ladies were not allowed into the bar. There was a very small lounge next to the bar with a hatch door through which ladies could order drinks. We used to call the division between the bar and the lounge the Berlin Wall - we had to wait a long time for it to come down. In the early 1970s there was an extension added to the lounge with a small dispenser bar. But this was not our own space and it was as much for men as for ladies. Later it was decided to put a dartboard beside the bar, so that when the men were at darts, ordering drinks could often be dangerous. As Peggie Hearne used to say, you could get your ears pierced for free if you got in the way. In those days there was still a partition in the lounge separating the ladies from the men.

The Berlin Wall eventually fell and a set of accordion doors was put up in its place. These could be opened after the presentation of prizes to the men, but only at the discretion of the Captain. The accordion doors were dispensed with a few years later but the rail on which they ran was left. This was still an effective barrier, for while ladies could now look into the bar, they still could not go in. We christened it the Eye Line. It was a great source of amusement to the vast majority of people. Change takes place slowly in golf clubs and it was a painful struggle for the ladies to be treated as equals. Some men were reluctant to cede an inch (even a millimetre!). There was often a strong sense of division particularly when it came to men's competition days on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

I remember during the period of the Eye Line, I invited my daughter and her future husband to the Club for a meal on a Wednesday evening. The bar was empty so we went in. We were keeping an eye on the 18th green waiting for my husband to finish. After about 30 minutes, three men came in and then the bar manager came down and asked me to move across the Eye Line into the lounge area. He was embarrassed and apologised. I was equally embarrassed and thought to myself 'am I a man or a mouse', and will I stand up against this male chauvinist attitude? Finally, I said I would stay until my husband came in and we were ready to go to the dining room. Other men drifted in but nothing more was said or done. It was one small step on our road to freedom. Some months later Peggy Hearne and Cherry Finn sat at the bar and were glared at by men, but one man (Dave Fox) joined them, bought them a drink, and that seemed to confirm a new attitude in the club. I think it was in 1986 that ladies' emancipation came to Delgany and we were at last allowed into the bar.

There was also a struggle to get equal rights on the golf course, a common experience in all clubs throughout the country in those days. They eventually came about after a series of small but important breakthroughs. In 1977, it was proposed by Paddy MacKeogh, and seconded by Kenny Johnston, that
