
Captains' Drive In photos

Our Course Volunteers

The course volunteers have now completed their 3rd session of work to improve the general husbandry of our course and it's surrounds. We have completed the following:

- Spread bark mulch around all the trees in OB area on the right hand side (RHS) of the 18th to enhance the look of the avenue as one approaches the car park
- Swept the winter debris from the car park
- Cleared out the leaves, acorns, pine needles and debris from the plantations on the 2nd, 4th and the 9th so far.
- Cleared the ditch on RHS of the 10th, from the old 11th tee to the 10th green.
- Incredibly, we filled approximately 55+ of the 1 tonne bags. Many thanks to Steven and the lads for organising the relay of emptying these bags that allowed us to keep going.....
- The secret ingredient that sustained us was the delicious cake and biscuits provided by Nollaig Greene and Bridget Bergin.


New Fairway Mower

After a wait of nearly one year, we finally took delivery of this key piece of golf course equipment last week. This €80,000 item of kit will be warmly welcomed by our team of five greenkeepers who have been keeping their thirteen year old machine going, held together by plasters and string for the last number of years. In fact, the old machine cost €7.5k in repairs last year alone. So this new Jacobsen mower is a godsend and will help with the fairway presentation standards coming into the new playing season.





The four wheel drive machine has a 50hp Kubota engine which will easily power up the steep inclines on some of our fairways. This new machine will improve the quality of cut, allowing for a cleaner, finer cut of grass blade thus improving the health of grass. Modern machinery and new engines lessen our impact on the environment which is a good thing.



Men's Competition News

Completion of Cards:

Once again we have to highlight the standard of card completion which continues to be a cause for concern and a "time waster" for your fellow members who have volunteered to check them. It is disheartening to see the lack of effort in completing this most basic of tasks as a golfer.

We know we have mentioned this before, but it is baffling that we see the same errors being made when handing in cards..... so once again we ask:

Please ensure that you adhere to these basic principles of card completion:

- * Write legibly poor figures/handwriting lead to errors
- * Check that all players handicaps are present on the card at the very least we need the Handicap Index and Playing Handicap
- * Use the required columns and boxes appropriately the "Res" column is the one that should be used for Stableford points
- * Please do us the courtesy of filling in the Stableford points as well as the gross score per hole. We don't have the time to check your card just because you didn't bother to!
- * Add up all your points please...at the very least you should provide the total points (or net score) achieved in the large "Result" box at the top of the card so we know if your card is a counting one or not.
- * You must have two signatures on your card...if one is absent then we will DQ that card. This happens very frequently and often when good scores are achieved.

Last but not least, hand in your card as soon as possible after your round - don't go upstairs and hand it in later.

Finally, here are a few diary notes...

- April Medal on April 14th/15th...still a good few slots available
- Monday, April 17th...we are trialling a 9-hole singles which will run early morning and late afternoon (with time for casual golf in between).
- April 23rd...Fourball Matchplay Qualifier
- April 26th...first Wednesday 9-hole Singles
- April 30th...Foursomes Matchplay Qualifier

Anne's first club was Kilcoole and she quickly realised, not only did she enjoy the game but also the social side of it. Austin was a little slower off the mark, he joined Ballymoney as a distance member to get his Handicap so he could play in Open days and Society golf with Anne. They both decided to join Charlesland Golf Club when Kilcoole closed, and really enjoyed the craic, the golf, the club atmosphere and friendships made. They were really disappointed when it closed, and joined Druids Heath, where they played their golf for the next couple of years before deciding to join Delgany GC in Jan '23.



Why join Delgany GC?

While Druids Heath offered good golf and great friends, they looked at joining Delgany GC for the added benefit of being a Members' Club with a Clubhouse and more Social events, as well as being a challenging and enjoyable course.

What are your golfing ambitions?

To get our Handicaps down and have some success (however limited) in competitions. Anne, being a little more competitive, would love to win one of the majors (while keeping her eye on a parking space)

Who are your sporting heroes?

Neither of them has a sporting hero as such, but they enjoy the achievements of individuals and teams across a wide range of sports.

What are your golfing successes so far?

Anne won the Lady Captain's Prize in Charlesland GC in 2018 and as luck would have it, was fortunate enough to have two holes in one, one in Woodbrook and one in Knightsbrook (she is looking for another club that ends in brook for her hat trick!). On the other hand, Austin's golfing successes have been limited to a couple of golf team society prizes, so he has all to play for!

Have you any interesting facts you would like to share?

Some members may remember Austin from the days when he played with the band 'Telephone Bill & The Smooth Operators'. Music is still a big part of his life and he's still entertaining in pubs and parties. Anne loves to paint using oils and is an active member of Kilmantin Art Gallery in Wicklow. She also has an interest in Angel Guidance and Angel Cards. Her artistic side helped her to come up with ideas and be involved with the fun side of things in previous clubs, she even dragged Austin along to help out with some of the social events.

the committee investigate the lack of golf and social facilities afforded to Lady Associates. To our great surprise it was agreed that the Committee would investigate the whole matter. Later, a Captain of the day invited the ladies to play on the Saturdays of international rugby matches. Even then he encountered opposition from some grumpy male members, old and young. We had to wait until 2000 for the first of many meetings between the mens' and ladies' committees that ultimately paved the way for Lady Associates to become full members. Nowadays, ladies joining are treated in the same way as men; they become pavilion or 5-day members, and then wait their turn to become full members.

Delgany has been blessed with many great characters among the ladies over the years. In particular, I remember Kitty Cashman. She was a favourite with the men and had a great dry wit. She never had a television, but instead listened to the radio while knitting socks for her three farmer brothers who lived in Cork. Kitty was one of the pioneers of the ladies. She managed to play her golf on Saturdays or Sundays, making use of the unwritten rule that ladies could play during lunchtime as long as the tee was free and they played only in a two ball. Another great lady is Audrey Buttimore. For years she looked after our junior girls and encouraged them to practice and enjoy their golf. From 1977 to 1987 she was a selector on the Leinster Committee of Junior Girls Golf

and in 1982 and 1983 a selector for all—Ireland Junior Golf. She also deserves huge congratulations for winning the Lady Captain's Prize in 2000, at 80 years young. Well done Audrey!

Delgany was always a favourite venue for lady golfers to come and play in open competitions. It was renowned for its warm welcome, friendship, hospitality and great fun. For almost a lifetime it has always been my second home – as my children often told me. I am now an Honorary Life Member, along with all the other ladies who joined in the 1940s. We feel privileged and delighted with this recognition.

5.5 THE LADIES GOLFING YEAR

The Ladies' calendar in Delgany is like a circle in which you could trace a graph and wrap your golfing year around it, closely linking it to the pattern of the seasons. It starts in December after the AGM with the Christmas Spirit Scramble - 9 holes, no fee, a prize for everyone, a gentle start. And as it is the new Lady Captain's first official night, an air of levity and fun pervades. For the next few weeks 9 holes are the order of the day to take us through the darkest part of winter: then it slowly moves to 12 holes, drifts into 15 as the days lengthen, and finally springs into action with an 18 hole competition at the end of March. But before that happens there is the White Elephant Rumble at the beginning of the month....15 holes, no

fee and a prize for all. At this stage, the ladies instinctively know that it is time to emerge from the closet and launch the new golfing season: five Majors, eight Medals and team fever. The battle of the Majors and Minors has begun and it spans the whole summer and early autumn, ending only with the fading light of October and a slow drifting back into the winter months of 15 holes, then 12, then 9, thus completing the golfing cycle.

There are currently 241 lady members in Delgany (a figure which includes 114 ordinary members). Enormous changes have taken place in the ladies' club over the last few decades, both on the course and off. For those ladies who remember the good old days when there were no dog-legs, when you followed the principle of up the mountain and down to the sea, when your handicap stayed intact once you played to it three times a year, when greens were often compared to fairways and golf was seasonal....for those ladies it is 'all changed, changed utterly'. While the new course has made ladies' golf much more challenging and the new handicapping and points system have made it a fairer game, it was the introduction of equality in 2001 that revolutionised the ladies' club. 'Person' has become an equality word, so while we gain we lose. To be a 'person' in Delgany you play the men's game, with a gracious nod or a wink from them towards the challenge involved. First we were granted a sex shot (or two), then it became a courtesy

shot, now it is a course alteration shot, as sanctioned by the I.L.G.U. However, being a Lady Golfer in Delgany is much more than being a lady or a golfer: it is being a member who truly belongs to a club where there is a strong feeling of camaraderie, a keen interest in golf and a great sense of loyalty.

Intertwined with the golfing calendar events are the ladies' Tuesday social evenings, with the weekly game of cards before and after dinner, the monthly Book Club meeting and major competition presentation nights. There might also be a quiz, wine tasting, a fashion show, golf rules with Gavin and team talks, all culminating in the night of the year in early November - the Lady Captain's Show. During the weeks leading up to this event, there is an air of feverish activity that is almost tangible, when prowess at golf and a career on the stage vie with each other. The show eventually explodes on the scene, when the ladies take over the club, much to the chagrin of the men, some of whom have been known to protest vociferously that they were actually barred from the bar on the eve of the show. The tradition of the show goes back as far as memory serves. In those early days it was a musical variety show that lasted all night, when days were longer and time moved more slowly. It is still a musical variety show, but it has become more streamlined, more tailored, slicker and shorter: now it is snappy, in line with the zapper age, but essentially it is the same show that pays homage to the lady captain and

marks the ladies' appreciation of all her hard work on their behalf during her year of office.

The Lady Captain's Show marks the slowing down of the golfing cycle and the end of the golfing year, with thoughts turning to winning turkeys, preparing for the AGM and pondering the turnaround in committee personnel. The circle does not break: it is a continuum that slackens and gathers pace in line with the seasons, all the while maintaining its own integrity. And so the ladies' club continues with its great spirit of friendship and care and solidarity.

5.6 EVOLUTION of the GOLF COURSE

The layout of the first golf course at Delgany is not known. Although Tom Hood of Musselborough origin (also the professional at Royal Dublin) was the official designer, it should be remembered that the founders of the club were strong-willed people with influence and standing in the community. They were also golfers, or at least they played golf. This combination would likely lead them to scrutinise, and probably adapt, Mr. Hood's vision of the most appropriate layout and features. In addition, in 1909 Harry Vardon made suggestions to change the design, in keeping with his views on layout established from his experience as a player and winner in Great Britain and America.

In the many years since Vardon made his recommendations, it is certain that the course would have been 'tweaked' here and there. For example, the larch spinney between the present 10th and 15th fairways was planted during Andy Ross's years of captaincy (1955 and 1956). So far as is known professional course architects were not involved in these 'tweaks': nevertheless, it is hard to imagine that any changes would have been made without the club having sought the views of the resident professional of the period - not least the Bradshaw family of Ned, Harry, Eddie and Jimmy.

To move on to what we know for certain about developments on the course, let us reflect on the layout of the course that had evolved by the early 1970s:

1st (par 4): from present 3rd tee (approx) up the present 4th fairway to plateau green level with current 3rd green and beneath the current 4th tee

2nd (par 4): from tee in/at the edge of the northern woodland, downhill to current 2nd green location, via the area between the current 4th and 5th fairways: there was an internal out-of-bounds area to the right of the 2nd fairway

3rd (par 4): the current 1st hole, essentially

4th (par 4): from tee close to current 6th green (nearer the gate), uphill to plateau green located close to hedge on eastern side of the course

5th (par 3): from tee well above old 4th green, uphill to green in top north—east corner of the course (a blind tee—shot!)

6th (par 4): from tee in/at the edge of northern woodland, down the current 6th fairway to green located on current 2nd fairway

7th (par 4): from tee on left side of current 2nd fairway (close to the chestnut tree) uphill to plateau green located close to current 7th green

8th (par 3): the current 8th hole (essentially), but from 'old' teeing ground

9th (par 4): the current 9th hole, essentially

10th (par 5): the current 10th hole, essentially

11th (par 4): the current 12th hole, essentially

12th (par 4): the current 13th hole, essentially

13th (par 3): the current 14th hole, essentially

14th (par 4): the current 15th hole (essentially), with men's tee close to current ladies' tee

15th (par 3): the current 16th hole, essentially

16th (par 4): the current 17th hole, essentially

17th (par 4): from tee close to bell at current 17th green, via the rough on left side of current 18th hole to flat green now used as a practice pitching green

18th (par 4): the current 18th hole, essentially, but a par 4, with men's tee close to ladies tee for current 10th hole and an open 'ditch' across the fairway at the current 'gap'

Par for the course was 69 (men) and 71 (ladies). The 'old' practice area was located on, and to the left, of the current 3rd fairway, and the teeing areas for the 'old' 2nd, 6th and 9th holes had been acquired from the State Forest Service (now Coillte) in 1965. Declan Clarke (with a 64 on 16/6/1973) and Doreen Brennan (72 on 24/7/1973) set the respective record low scores for this course.

In the early 1970s, a judgement was made that the 'uphill-downhill' nature of the course (especially on the front 9 holes) was placing undue physical demands on golfers: just as importantly, it was also felt that the quality of the golf course (bunkering, width of fairways,
