Our Delgany Bee's were housed last week in their new home between the 9th and 10th fairways, many thanks to our beekeepers Jean Taylor and Billy Markham for moving them safely into their hives and to Dave Caul and the Course team for constructing a base and pen to keep them safe from predators. In line with our sustainability agenda, only recycled materials were used for constructing the pens. The bees are adding to an already diverse wildlife on our lovely course.





Our member Ronan Moore is an expert in the variety of animals and birds who have made their home with us. We often have wild animals crossing the course at all times of the day and night leaving tell-tale signs of their presence as they go - Badgers, Foxes, Grey and occasionally Red Squirrels (although the latter are rare), as well as our Sika Deer friends. Ronan tells us that well over 100 species of bird life visit or reside on our club lands over the year. Recently a couple of Red Kites stayed around for a few days. More commonly seen are Buzzard, Sparrow Hawk and Kestrel with Peregrine Falcons in mid-summer teaching their young to prey on Wood pigeons which are very common.

Jays and Greater Spotted Woodpeckers can be heard and seen in the trees around the course. Of the smaller bird species colourful Goldfinches and Bullfinches are very often seen around the carpark. During the summer we welcome many species of Warbler that make their way here from West Africa and Southern Europe. The song of the Blackcap which is likened to that of a Nightingale can be heard as can the Chiffchaff which is one of the first of our summer visitors. These are just a few of the great variety of birds which we can witness. **Many thanks Ronan for this fascinating information.**

Finally, a big shout out to our Facebook organiser Jason Bradshaw and all the Communications team (led by Tony Corcoran) for their work on promoting the club and our activities on social media. We recently received a very favourable comment from a prominent local business person on the quality of our social media content which they consider to be way ahead of other clubs. Keep it up guys!

Member's Information Meeting on our Golf Course challenges:

The Course Committee hosted an interesting and informative meeting for over 60 members on Thursday 20th April last. This email is a summary of its main messages and key recommendations.

Our primary message is that members and golfers must be part of the solution to our course challenges. Therefore, we are asking everyone to follow the Four R's:

- Repair Pitch Marks
- Replace and/or Sand Divots
- Rake Bunkers
- Ropes/ other Markings, heed...



If we all take pride in our course and proactively promote these 4 'Rs' then we can make a real and sustained difference to its condition and playability. This support needs, on occasion, to include reminding fellow members and guests of how we do things at DGC, gently but firmly.

Talking Delgany up

When Captain Tom took up his captaincy, he announced that one of his mantras for his year would be to "talk Delgany up". And why not, we have a great club, friendly members, in a super setting, and a lovely course. Taking Tom's mantra on board, the Course Committee also seeks to elevate our course and our perception to increase our enjoyment and pride in our great club.

The work of the Course Committee

Our overriding objective is to work with our course staff, management committee, General Manager, and members to produce as playable a course as is possible within our resources and to enhance our member's playing experience.

Course News

To do this we aim to:

- Develop clear communications to ensure an exchange of information and views.
- Encourage members' support to keep the course and surrounding areas in good condition.
- To justify, where possible, the required investment in machinery and resources.
- Guide and support the Course team
- Receive a monthly report on course activity.
- Agree action Items for clarity & accountability.
- Produce a healthy and disease-free golf course

To relentlessly pursue improvement in course presentation and playability within our resources.

I am delighted to say that since taking over as Chair of the Course Committee last November I have enjoyed excellent engagement and support from the members, the course team, the General Manager, and the Course Committee.

Resources

We have had a vacancy for a greenkeeper for some months now. Rest assured, we are doing our utmost to fill this position in a tight labour market and, in the meantime, we hope to find two temporary staff to cover the busy growing months.

We recently took delivery of our new fairway mower which is a big boost to the course team, and we are in the process of ordering a replacement roughs mower. These are major capital investment items and are badly needed. Over the past decade, meeting the ongoing challenge of our debt repayment has resulted in an underinvestment, most notably in our course plant and machinery and the clubhouse.

However, despite the new acquisitions, with the average age of our remaining course equipment being 12+ years, we need continued investment to catch up and a wish list would include our greens mower, aerator, bunker rake machine, tractor, digger, tees mower and a leaf blower.

In addition, there are a host of competing and important course related projects that will need addressing over the coming years such as a sprinkler system and piping upgrade, reservoir upgrade and new well, avenue upgrade, a major thinning out of our plantations, boundary marking and protection, a buggy path extension and other course development and upgrade works.

The course staff have an abundance of tasks, those prioritised in the growing season (now) and also the maintenance and improvement projects best suited to the winter months. At the course information meeting I went into some of these in detail but in this report, I want to reiterate the four R's, especially replacing divots and repairing pitch marks on our greens.

Repairing Divots

We cannot allow this on our course......




An unrepaired divot will take months to recover, and the solution is easy:

If the divot is intact with soil attached replace it and firmly press the divot into the ground. Any significant gaps with the surrounding turf should be filled with the divot mix. Alternatively, fill the divot with mix and press down.

HOW TO REPAIR A PITCHMARK



Correct Method

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It takes 20 seconds to repair a pitch mark, a fraction of the time each player spends on the green. Correctly repaired pitch marks will recover in 24 hours whereas an incorrectly repaired pitch mark takes 3 to 4 weeks. Worst of all, an unrepaired pitch mark takes up to 2 months to recover. So, find the grass, do not expose the sand, root mix or soil as this delays healing. Do not replace any displaced turf – correctly repair as per the diagram above and remember to carry a pitchfork repairer, in your pocket, not in your bag!

If every golfer repaired two pitch marks on a green, we could have

a pitch mark free golf course!

Our volunteers

We recently introduced a volunteer group to assist with some tasks that the course staff cannot reach currently. Projects completed to date include bark mulch around trees at the OB on the right hand-side of the 18th hole, swept & tidied the car park, cleared out the plantations on 2, 4 and 9th holes and cleared out the top ditch on the right-hand side of the 10th.

It's a great group and the work is energetic but fun. When light permits, we will organise some evening sessions for those of you who are working but would like to contribute. Please get in touch!

And that could make us unique!!!!!










green. In fact, because the green was directly gouged out of the slope, there was a residual bank at the back of the green, and shots that were too big would often hit this bank and bounce back on to the putting surface. Mr. Merrigan transformed this hole by a combination of subtle changes. Firstly, he moved the green further back into the hill and a little to the right. Secondly, a hollow gully between the back of the green and the exposed rock face was created so that recovery from this area to a green sloping away from you is quite difficult. Thirdly, he protected access to the green by incorporating a steep bank at the front and a deep bunker at the left front edge, both designed to punish shots that fall short (similar to the changes that were made to the 12th green and its

surrounds). The effect of Mr. Merrigan's adaptations to the 7th hole has been to reduce the index from 12 to 4 for men, and from 5 to 2 for ladies. It is worth mentioning here that the 7th green was the only location on the course where the underlying parent material of the soil (shattered shale) was encountered and the parent rock was left exposed as a memorable backdrop to the hole.

Vardon believed in 'the desirability of having undulating putting greens instead of flat ones'. He felt that putting requires more attention on sloping greens than on flat ones and 'concentration of the mind is the surest means to successful putting'. Later course designers have taken this idea a little further and incorporate slopes, ridges and shoulders



on most new greens. These require golfers to be accurate with their approach shots, aiming at specific areas to allow subsequent straightforward access to the holes. Mr. Merrigan's overall view is that the modern golf course should require golfers to improve their game while being aesthetically pleasing and memorable. Greens have not only to be hit, but hit in the right place-being long at the 11th gives an extremely difficult approach to most pins on this green. In contrast, Vardon makes little mention of the 'appearance' of the course though he would probably approve of the modern contouring of greens, environs and fairways: on the other hand he would likely believe that the shaping, 'striping' and fertilising of fairways to be bordering on pandering!

Mr. Merrigan's revision of the par three 8th hole illustrates the modern view of course design. The new green was raised considerably and inclined slightly towards the tee: shots that are too long or too left will bounce off the resultant slope and end up some distance from the target. There is a slightly raised shelf at the back of this green for the blue pin positions: only the brave attempt the carry to this level. The medal tee was also elevated and moved further back to the right, thus bringing the green into tantalising view and forcing players to flirt with the trees on the right should they wander even slightly off line. The green itself is subtly contoured with a testing diagonal ridge giving rise to demanding pin positions, and clenched

buttocks.

The 9th hole was creatively upgraded from a straightforward and relatively short hole to an excellent test of power combined with accuracy. The tee was moved back into the woods and elevated. The green was moved to the left, widened and also elevated, with subtle 'shaping' around the perimeter. It is one of the most level greens on the course but is protected left and right by two large bunkers, leaving a narrow entrance between them: an overlong approach will kick off the bank at the back towards the 18th fairway. On medal and major days the pin may be at the extreme left or right side of the green, presenting the golfer with a difficult approach over either bunker, with limited landing room. Golfers who encounter trouble early on in the hole can however attempt to thread the ball through the front gap on to the green.

Increased difficulty is not a universally welcome change, but a relatively short course requires features to test the golfer and encourage shotmaking. The new layout and design has brought the whole course to a new level, reflecting the evolution of course design since Harry Vardon walked its hills. Harry Vardon was one of the first celebrity golfers, and his views on the emerging science of golf course architecture carried some weight, and reflected the thinking and the equipment of his time in both Great Britain and America. He standardised the golf grip which has laid the basis of

competitions indefinitely owing to the war' (10/8/1914).

-proposed that a number of competitions be arranged for the coming season' (3/5/1919).
- 'as the lease of the club would expire to-night, he considered that it would be advisable for some person to sleep on the premises for a few nights. The Secretary promised to have the necessary arrangements made' (31/5/1926) – Advice to Committee by Club Solicitor.
- The sanction of the Committee was granted for writing off liquor to the value of £2–16s–2d supplied during March, April and June 1932 in entertainment of visitors' (9/1/1933).
- •'It was ordered that the following articles be obtained: two shoe horns (long) and two clothes brushes, to be hung in Gents Dressing Room: one shoe horn (long) and one clothes brush to be hung in Ladies Dressing Room' (20/4/1936)-nothing spared in the furnishing of the new clubhouse!
- *no quorum in attendance' (10/8/1936)
 Committee meeting not held!
- •'£5 gratuity to be paid to Davis' (9/5/1938) – i.e., Murt Davis, because he only charged £30–11s–6d to erect a coal house compared to a price of £78 submitted by a local contractor for the same job.
-after discussion of prices charged for liquors, it was decided to reduce Club Orange from 7d to 6d a bottle'

(14/12/1940).

- •'in view of present conditions, no entries would be made this year for the Barton and Junior Cup competitions' (3/3/1941).
- 'charges for Scotch Whiskey and Gin should be advanced by 2s–4d per glass in each case' (8/11/1943).
- A further complaint that a member of the club was observed caddying is to be enquired into and the result reported to the Special Meeting' (8/7/1944).
- •'The stocks of sherry are to be increased, and enquiries are to be made as to the possibility of obtaining further supplies of Scotch Whiskey and Gin' (13/11/1944).
- 'The Captain is to arrange to have an offer made for the piano being sold at the forthcoming local auction, the offer not to exceed £30' (8/1/1945).
- •'It was noted that a piano had been purchased and installed in the Clubhouse at a cost of £25–4s–0d' (12/2/1945).
- •'It was noted that there were six dozen golf balls on hands and it was decided to hand over one dozen to the Ladies Committee and to retain the remainder until the Captain's Prize on which occasion each competitor would be allowed to purchase one ball' (12/8/1946).
- Messrs Mitchell wrote to say that the supplies of Scotch whiskey have to be reduced to three bottles per month.

Messrs Jameson intimated that they would increase the Club's allocation of Irish whiskey by one dozen bottles per month' (12/5/1947).


